1. Status of the School Regarding External Submissions and Awards (please note, these data were shared at the convocation)

This year, our colleagues brought in \$10.16 million in funding. As a result, HHS remains the lead academic unit in external funding on campus. This is our 4th consecutive year breaking the \$10 million mark. The university as a whole broke the \$50 million dollar mark for the first time. KUDOS!

Further, 12 academic departments campus-wide brought in more than a million dollars last fiscal year; and 5 of the 12 are from HHS!

- Nutrition, \$1.02 million (special shout out for new accomplishment!)
- · Social Work, \$1.07 million
- · Kinesiology, \$1.25 million
- Public Health Education, \$1.27 million
- Human Development and Family Studies, \$4.47 million

HDFS remains the academic department that brought in the most external funding. WOW!

External submissions increased by over \$8 million dollars last year relative to the previous year with over \$38.68 million dollars requested. Given the incredible stressors faced by faculty over the last 2+ years, this is a tremendous success. Thank you to each and every person who submitted an application, and Verna as well as Lisa and Hannah who assisted with various applications!

2. Internal Funding Available and Research Workshops this Academic Year (attachment)

I am pleased to report that HHS and UNCG's commitment to research remains high as evidenced by ongoing internal support for research. Please note, the goal of the HHS Research Initiatives Funding is to meet faculty research needs. 4. HHS RAC Membership this AY

The HHS Research Advisory Committee (RAC) members advise me about a number of matters including the use of resources, research policies, and researcher needs. They also serve as reviewers of internal grant applications and serve as the selection committee for HHS Research Excellence Awards, along with ad hoc faculty who are assembled based on needed expertise or due to conflicts (please see our Conflict of Interest Policy). The committee currently consists of seven faculty from six HHS departments, named below (*denotes members new to the committee this AY). Membership is at my invitation and in consultation with department chairs. I strive to have representation from varied fields of study and research traditions (e.g., quantitative, qualitative, basic/bench, applied/community engaged), but workload factors in to who is able to serve as does the likelihood of having frequent conflicts (e.g., pre-tenure faculty apply for more internal funding than mid and later career faculty). The composition of the RAC will continue to evolve based on lessons learned from the HHS OOR Equity Audit and changing needs over time. 5. Updates: HHS OOR Equity Audit

We continue to make strides to address themes that emerged in the equity audit. Additional work/plans since the last update (sent on March 18) by theme include:

Improve communication, reduce microaggressions and enhance transparency

Finished full group OOR meetings with Dr. Silvia Bettez; as a next step Assistant Dean Lisa Walker and I will
continue to meet with Dr. Bettez to dig deeper into issues related to power, white privilege, and communication
tendencies given our roles involve frequent school wide communication and decisions related to resource
allocation

Clarify mission of the HHS OOR and align services

Enhance support available for qualitative and community engaged researchers

- Attended multi-day web conference, Campus Compact, which focused on DEI and community engagement, thanks to funding from UNCGs ICEE, to learn more about community engagement
- Met with Interim Associate Provost for Outreach and Engagement from Michigan State University to learn about their programming and to solicit information about other models and contacts
- Designated research/team space in the Moore building to Dr. Sharon Morrison and Dr. Sudha Shreeniwas that will
 be used in their ongoing community engaged research (e.g., team space for undergraduate and graduate RAs to
 meet and work, conference room space for meetings with community partners, etc)

- Appointed Dr. Sharon Morrison as Faculty Fellow for Community Engaged Research and met with her to discuss
 plans for the fall semester
- Conducted interviews with 5 qualitative researchers this summer to better understand unmet needs, to generate novel solutions, and to get feedback on some ideas for the future

6. Seeking Feedback on Revised Mission Statement: Response Requested

One lesson learned from the HHS OOR Equity Audit was that our Mission Statement was not well-aligned with the services we provide. We (HHS OOR Personnel) have drafted a new statement that we believe better fits. In doing so, we considered our charge from the Dean, expectations of us from central research offices, the primary functions of each full-time position in the OOR and the goals of the programs/initiatives we offer. We are at a point where we would like to invite faculty feedback on the revised statement prior to considering it finalized. We will also seek feedback from the HHS RAC and Chairs Council. The current and proposed statements are noted below along with a link to a google form for your feedback.

<u>Current:</u> The School of Health and Human Sciences Office of Research's mission is to provide exceptional unit-based support services that equitably facilitate faculty success with research development, grant submission and management, and scholarly productivity.

<u>Proposed:</u> The mission of the School of Health and Human Sciences Office of Research is to provide exceptional unit-based support services that equitably: (1) facilitate success with external grant/contract submission and management; (2) disseminate information about research-related policies, systems, and opportunities within the school, university and beyond; and (3) generate and manage resources designed to support faculty excellence in research.
